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ABOUT THE TOUR

This trip offers a once-in-a lifetime opportunity to follow in the footsteps of the great Russian writers with a tour leader, Rosamund Bartlett, who is perfectly suited to guide you. Rosamund is a talented writer, biographer of Tolstoy and Chekhov, and acclaimed translator of both. Her unquenchable thirst for Russian literature and history, and their connections with music and art, has made her deeply knowledgeable and passionate about the country and its cultural milieux as well as a frequent visitor to Russia.

Our literary exploration begins in Moscow, where we will visit the homes and haunts of such varied writers as Gorky, Tolstoy and Bulgakov, and explore painterly connections at the Tretyakov Gallery. Across the river, we will step inside the frescoed cathedrals of the medieval Kremlin.


Rosamund will guide us beyond the domes and galleries of Moscow, deep into the

literary heartland of the Russian countryside. For many Russian writers, nature itself was a guide to living with grace and purpose. During this trip, we will spend two nights at Yasnaya Polyana, where Tolstoy lived and wrote and where he built a community around simplicity, nature and moral truth.

After our sojourn at Yasnaya Polyana, we will travel by bus to Chekhov's country estate in sleepy Melikhovo, then fly to beautiful St Petersburg. In September, bathed in the golden light of autumn, and mostly without tourists, the city has so much to offer including the homes of Dostoevsky and the extraordinary poet Anna Akhmatova, and the Hermitage and Russian Museum.

This is a wonderful chance to see Russia as rarely seen by Western travellers. Explore the creativity of Moscow and St Petersburg through the lens of the lives and works of some of Russia's greatest men and women of letters.





TOUR HIGHLIGHTS

Visit Red Square and St Basil's Cathedral. Explore the nearby gardens and Manège, where Tolstoy learned to ride his bicycle at the age of 67. Red Square is just a stone's throw from your hotel.

Take a stroll around Patriarch's Ponds, the setting for scenes from *Master and Margarita*. Sip tea by the Moscow Art Theatre and discuss Chekhov's *The Black Monk* with Rosamund over a blini or three!

Tour the amazing stations of Moscow's Metro, where chandeliers and sculptures, jasper, marble and glass combine in many different styles, deep underground.

Immerse yourself in Tolstoy's world when you stay for two nights in the landscape of Tolstoy's family home. Amble beneath silver poplars and dine with fellow literature lovers for the opening address of the international translators' symposium at the estate, now in its fourteenth year.

Experience five nights in stunning St Petersburg, the city of poets. See the rearing statue of *The Bronze Horseman*, visit Pushkin's wonderful apartment on the Moika River, and Anna Akhmatova's on the embankment of the Fontanka.


Lose yourself in the unparalleled collection of art at the Hermitage, hung in rooms of malachite and gold.



Rosamund Bartlett, Tour Leader

Rosamund Bartlett was born in London, holds a doctorate from Oxford, and has been travelling to Russia since 1978. She began learning Russian as a schoolgirl, and is the author of Chekhov: Scenes from a Life, Tolstoy: A Russian Life and Literary Russia: A Guide. Her work as a translator includes Anton Chekhov, About Love and Other Stories, the first uncensored edition of his letters for Penguin Classics, and Anna Karenina, published by Oxford World's Classics in 2014. Her most recent book is The Russian Soul: Selections from a Writer's Diary by Fyodor Dostoevsky. She has lectured on Russian literature at universities and public institutions around the world, and been commissioned to write for publications such as the Financial Times, The Guardian, and The Wall Street Journal. In 2007 she began a campaign to restore Chekhov's house in Yalta, and remains a Trustee of the Anton Chekhov Foundation, a UK charity set up to honour the writer's literary and humanitarian legacy. She is a regular visitor to Australia and is currently an Honorary Research Associate at the School of Modern Languages and Cultures at the University of Sydney.

Friday September 6th

Arrival Moscow

We arrive in bustling Moscow, where medieval echoes sound along modern streets and beautiful domed churches surprise us at every turn.

On arrival, our driver and guide take us from the airport to the **stunning Hotel National**, situated right by the Kremlin in the heart of the city.

We can venture outside when we are ready to stretch our legs in the popular Alexander Garden and Manège (where Tolstoy learned to ride a bicycle aged 67), or orient ourselves with a stroll to Red Square, just steps from the hotel. As the sun sets, we will meet in our hotel for informal drinks and dinner.






After breakfast, Rosamund will set the scene for the day, sketching out writer and playwright **Anton Chekhov's** connection with the city; introducing avant-garde poet, **Vladimir Mayakovsky**, whose work (and suicide) shocked the nation, and writer **Maxim Gorky** who portrayed village life in unsparing detail – a friend to Chekhov and a towering figure in literature and public life.

Chekhov's house will be closed during our visit due renovations, but the exhibition will be moved to the private house of painter Ilya Ostroukhov.

Ostroukhov's house, nestled in the heart of old Moscow, is well worth visiting. The owner was a leading collector in the Moscow art world of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. His collection was referred to in a 1914 cityguide as one of Moscow's foremost attractions and was frequented by art lovers, which gave considerable trouble — as well as pleasure — to its owner. Rosamund will share many fascinating stories about him with you.

We stop for lunch just a few streets away, in the former administrative offices of the **Central House of Writers**. The celebrated fine dining establishment is in a neo-Gothic, nineteenthcentury mansion which Stalin gave to literature



at Maxim Gorky's request. This fabulous restaurant's ornate interior was redesigned with a light modern touch by Moscow architect Anna Rodionova in 2014.

We stay in the area to visit the former home of **Vladimir Mayakovsky**, now an apartment-museum on Krasnaya Presnaya Street.


We then take a short drive to the brilliant Ryabushinsky Mansion, now better known to Muscovites as the house of **Maxim Gorky**. With an amazing wavy marble staircase and exquisite stained glass windows, this is an Art Nouveau gem designed by architect Fyodor Shekhtel, friend to Chekhov and architect of many treasured early twentieth-century buildings still extant in Moscow.

After we return to the hotel, the evening is free. Our hotel is surrounded by restaurants, bars and cafés, and we are also just a short walk from the Bolshoi Theatre precinct and the restaurants off Red Square.

With the cultural season in full swing, there is likely to be an **opera**, **concert or ballet** to take in, with arrangements to be advised as soon as programs begin to be advertised.

Our relaxed Sunday includes a trip to the beautiful **Novodevichy Cemetery** and the glorious cathedrals of the **Kremlin**.

Our day begins in a quiet part of town with a visit to **Tolstoy's Moscow home**. The wooden house on Lev Tolstoy Street is set on almost two acres. We will have time to walk through the lovely garden graced by linden and maple trees that date from Tolstoy's days living here.

After exploring the grounds and interior, we stay in the neighbourhood to visit the **Novodevichy Cemetery and Convent** a short drive away.

A place of honour, second only to the Kremlin walls, everyone who is anyone is buried at Novodevichy - the country's most famous ballerinas, actors, composers, doctors and politicians and writers, perhaps most beloved of all Russians. Will be out and about today, bringing fresh flowers and pausing to admire the many varied headstones in sculptural and bas-relief.



After ambling along the hallowed rows – there is Nikolai Gogol, Anton Chekhov and Olga Knipper, Vladimir Mayakovsky, Mikhail Bulgakov – we stop for lunch at Moscow's much-loved **Georgian restaurant**, **U Pirosmani**, which overlooks the convent gardens of Novodevichy.

After lunch, we return to our hotel and walk across to the **Kremlin**, replete with architectural beauty, precious jewels and reliquary. In the **Armoury Chamber** we will see the unparalleled craftsmanship of Fabergé and the many other artisans and couturiers who served the tsars and gentry. Afterwards we will be able to go inside a number of the splendid cathedrals of the citadel where tsars have been crowned and remain entombed today in medieval splendour.

The evening is free for you to take in an early concert (with details to be supplied). Alternatively, have a drink at the Metropole, or walk across Red Square to see St Basil's cathedral at dusk.

Monday September 9th

Moscow – Free day

After breakfast we will join Rosamund for a stimulating talk on cultural Moscow, in advance of our trip to the Tretyakov Gallery tomorrow and to Tolstoy's birthplace and country home, Yasnaya Polyana. Bring all your questions with vou!

Customise your itinerary today and make it as jam-packed or restful as you need.

You might scour the famous Arbat Street for souvenirs or take yourself to historic Kitai Gorod, east of the hotel

You might join Rosamund to explore Bulgakov territory at Patriarch's Ponds, or rest up and meet for a book club-style discussion of The Black Monk by Anton Chekhov over afternoon tea near the hotel.

We will meet to compare notes over dinner at the legendary Café Pushkin, where we will enjoy refined Russian fare in a perfect spot for bibliophiles, the well-appointed Library Hall.

After dinner, we venture deep underground to visit the splendid stops of the Moscow Metro. A gargantuan project that began in the 1930s, the Metro stations are true palaces of the people, each with its own distinctive architectural style and palette.


Moscow, Tretyakov Gallery & travel to Yasnaya Polyana

We check out of our beautiful hotel in preparation for our country sojourn and visit to Yasnaya Polyana. Our final day in Moscow begins at the world-class **Tretyakov Gallery**. Its extraordinary holdings include a remarkable collection of portraits of writers, composers, musicians and actors. These include Vasily Perov's hauntingly brilliant Dostoevsky, Nikolai Ge's depiction of Tolstoy bent over his writing and Ilya Repin's complex portrait of Turgenev.

We pause for lunch next door to the gallery at the lovely Russian restaurant, Brothers Tretyakov, before our journey into the countryside, where many Russians say the real Russia begins. During the 200km drive south of Moscow we pass villages and birch-fringed fields, and the city of Tula, to arrive at our hotel in the early evening. The Grumant Park Hotel is set in leafy parklands just 1.5km from Tolstoy's estate of Yasnaya Polyana.

We will have a chance to rest or take a walk before dinner in the restaurant in the hotel, where we will stay for two nights.

Wednesday September 11th





Yasnaya Polyana

We wake up to country air in the birch-forested landscape that nourished and inspired Tolstoy throughout his life.

The whole day is ours to spend at Yasnaya Polyana ('Clear Glade', or 'Bright Meadow'). We take in the estate grounds at our leisure: choose a path through the forest or sit by the pond; wander along the avenues of birches or stroll around the outbuildings still actively in use.

Together, we will visit the interior of the main house itself, where Tolstoy wrote Anna Karenina and War and Peace and received Turgeney, Gorky and Chekhov, among many other visitors to the estate. The house remains largely as it was at the time of Tolstoy's death. In the study, we will see the leather sofa on which Tolstoy himself was born, and where Sophia Andreyevna gave birth to thirteen children. The remaining volumes of Tolstoy's impressive library still on the shelves include books in many foreign languages (including Japanese, which he was teaching himself at the time of his death).

At the cosy Russian café outside the gates of the estate we will stop for a simple lunch.


After lunch, we can stroll down the main street of the tiny village also named Yasnaya Polyana and walk to the place where Tolstoy lies buried on his property in a tranquil clearing in dappled light – a place of simple beauty and spiritual significance for many.

Today marks the first day of Yasnaya Polyana's annual International Seminar of Translators of Works of Leo Tolstoy and Other Russian Classical Authors, to which Rosamund has been invited to give the **opening address**. We will also participate, by mingling with scholars, translators and other lovers of literature over dinner hearing Rosamund's address, delivered in English.

Melikhovo & arrival in St Petersburg

After breakfast, our driver takes us north to the village of **Melikhovo**, some 90 minutes by road from Yasnaya Polyana. It was at this pastoral retreat that Chekhov spent seven years as a successful writer, only leaving finally for the Crimea when his health deteriorated. Within the peaceful walls of this charming wooden house Chekhov wrote The Seagull, Uncle Vanya and The Black Monk.

With its rambling gardens, this sprawling museum complex invites exploration. We visit Chekhov's **house** where paintings by his friend Levitan still hang on the walls, his medical surgery where his instruments have been retained, and take a turn around the grounds, planted with herbs, flowers and vegetables in honour of Chekhov's love of gardens and gardening.

We stop for a simple Russian lunch in the museum café and in due course set off for Domodedovo airport located south of Moscow, for our flight to St Petersburg.

Our wonderful hotel, the **Angleterre**, is superbly situated by the stunning dome of St Isaac's Cathedral, ringed by twelve bronze angels. Our driver will take us from the airport to the hotel, where a light supper awaits.

St Petersburg – Dostoevsky, the Hermitage

After breakfast, our driver takes us to the innercity **Kuznechny Market** to start the day at St Petersburg's most famous covered market. Enjoy the colorful array of fresh produce, meat and cheese, Central Asian delicacies, nuts and coffee, honey, preserves and pastries.

A short walk away, we visit the nearby **Dostoevsky Museum** in the writer's last apartment, where he wrote *The Brothers Karamazov* (and where he died). Then choose from a cluster of cheerful local cafés for a quick lunch. Our driver then takes us across town for an afternoon of world art at the legendary **State Hermitage Museum**.

Our guide takes us down the halls of the **Winter Palace** where we explore the main collection of the Hermitage, including the masterpieces of Leonardo da Vinci, Raphael, Rembrandt, El Greco, Goya and Gainsborough, as well as the Impressionists and Post-Impressionists in the



General Staff Building wing. We visit the famous **Diamond Room** containing the unique collection of priceless gems that belonged to the Romanov family. Each room and hallway is a work of art in itself.

After a rest and dinner, we meet for evening drinks at the **Stray Dog**. An artistic establishment with its heyday in the Silver Age, Anna Akhmatova, Osip Mandelstam and Vladimir Mayakovsky were among those who read poetry to packed crowds, and enjoyed intimate theatrical performances in this basement café-bar.

Saturday September 14th

St Petersburg, City

After breakfast, our driver drops us at the historic **Arts Square** for a morning of Russian art at the fabulous Russian Museum. Salute the statue of Pushkin in the square and explore the enormous and varied collection of superb paintings inside. We will pore over precious icons, as well as works by Levitsky, Bryullov, Repin, Vereshchagin, Goncharova and Malevich, and art from major art centres outside of the capital such as Novgorod and Kazan.

Our driver will collect us for the short trip to **Anna** Akhmatova's former apartment.

On the way to the apartment-museum, we will look out for the Muruzi House, an especially ornate building with myriad literary connections including the site of Joseph Brodky's former communal apartment. We also pass the Ustinov Mansion, where the brilliant novelist Ivan Goncharov lived and died



We visit the richly detailed Anna Akhmatova Museum at the Fountain House, in the southern wing of the eighteenth century **Sheremetyev palace** on the Fontanka River. Akhmatova had an apartment here for 30 years from the mid 1920s.

After returning to the hotel, venture further afield on your own but join Rosamund after lunch for a Crime and Punishment themed tour on foot. Afterwards, take a stroll along **Nevsky Prospect** or the Admiralty District, then return to the hotel for a talk by Rosamund before dinner ahead of an early start for our homage to Akhmatova and excursion across the Gulf of Finland to Peterhof tomorrow



Sunday September 15th

Komarovo, Kronstadt & Peterhof

We rise early for a day out of town, starting with a visit to **Anna Akhmatova's grave** and the dacha settlement of **Komarovo**, where the poet found a kind of peace in her tiny summer house. While we will not be able to visit the house itself, the settlement of Komarovo which lies 45kms from the city centre, in forested land on the Finnish Gulf, is tranquil and beautiful.

After stopping in Komarovo we **cross the Finnish Gulf** by road, stopping briefly on the **island of Kronstadt**, long a key Russian naval base and more recently a blood-soaked turning point in Bolshevik history. After stretching our legs by the marvellous St Nicholas Naval Cathedral which honours the Kronstadt sailors, we continue on to the **UNESCO World Heritage site of Peterhof**, across the Gulf.



On arrival you are sure to be dazzled by the fountains and baroque opulence of the Peterhof **palace complex**. We stop for lunch in the restaurant there, then spend the afternoon exploring the luxurious palace interior and grounds. We walk through the gardens, alongside the ornamental lakes and follies and admire Peter the Great's marvellously exuberant residence on the shore.

We return to the hotel and, with arrangements to be advised, hope to attend an opera or ballet performance at the Mariinsky Theatre this evening.

B D Monday September 16th

St Petersburg, City

After breakfast, our driver takes us to see the interior of the extraordinary Church of Christ the Saviour on Spilt Blood in central St Petersburg. The church was founded in 1883 and built to honour the life of Alexander II, who was fatally wounded by a revolutionary on this site. The exquisite lapidary work that covers each centimeter of the church walls and pillars took thirty years to restore after early Soviet neglect, and the effect is, breathtaking.

Our driver then drops us at the Alexander Pushkin Museum and Memorial Apartment, in an eighteenth-century stone mansion on the Moika River, which was Pushkin's last residence, and where he died on 29 January 1837 after being wounded in a duel. The site became a museum in 1925 but was already known as Pushkin's home to residents of the city. A clock in the study is set to the precise time of his death.


Having filled your cup with Pushkin, travel back to the hotel with our driver and spend the afternoon near St Isaac's, or walk out along the Moika to Nevsky Prospect for sightseeing in the area. It is our last afternoon in St Petersburg; we make the most of our time to soak up the atmosphere, visit bookshops, drink tea and eat pastries or walk in the city parks, lovely in the golden autumn light.

We meet at the hotel for a lift to dinner at the fashionable bar-restaurant, Vinny Shkaf (The Wine Cellar), on buzzy Rubinstein Street.

Tuesday September 17th



City sights & departure

After breakfast and check-out, we enjoy a final morning of sights before bidding the city farewell.

We pay a visit to the small **Nabokov Museum** – housed in the grand former childhood home of the writer before he went into exile - then drive to the Tikhvinskoe Cemetery at the Alexander Nevsky Monastery. At this Necropolis of the Artists we visit the graves of writers Nikolai Karamzin, Ivan Krylov and Fyodor Dostoevsky.

If time permits, we will visit the Peter-Paul Fortress, by now a familiar sight across the river, where writers imprisoned within its walls have included Maxim Gorky, Dostoevsky and Nikolai Chernyshevsky (where he wrote the revolutionary novel, What is to be Done?).

And at last – it is time to leave.

Ensure you have a good novel for the flight.

Take one last look at the angels of St Isaac's Cathedral, as the driver departs for the airport, and takes you on to your next destination.
